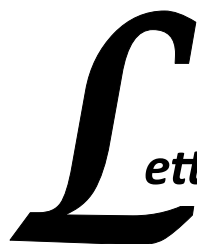

National Hunting and Fishing Day

Frank Wyman, John Arrabito, my bride, Teresa and I recently joined Steven Dazey from the WDFW and dozens of outdoor organizations at Camp Pigott in Snohomish County to celebrate **National Hunting and Fishing Day** (see page 5 for photos from the day). The event hosts hundreds of kids and their parents and introduces them to a broad array of outdoor pursuits. Of course WWA was on site with the duck mount display, and it was a **huge hit** with both kids and parents...the vast majority of who had never seen it before.

But we weren't the only participants by any stretch. There were representatives from the trapping, shooting sports, back country horsemen, fishing, archery, Boy Scouts, and many, many more. I wish I could give credit to all. Over 800 youngsters and their families attended.

I was pleasantly surprised over the numbers of parents inquiring about waterfowl hunting; parents whom I'm sure had never considered our pastime previously. I have to say I was tickled to see the numbers of families that were first or second generation Americans who seemed just thrilled at the prospects of introducing their kids to outdoor pursuits. Many parents were eager to see their kids experience this piece of Americana, this piece of R & R not realized in every corner of our planet.

In recent years I have received a flurry of calls from people looking for **Federal Duck Stamps** around opening day. It appears that many Post Offices have not been stocking them adequately in recent years. Waterfowlers have frequently had to go to multiple post offices before scoring.

Don't wait 'til the last minute.

Presidents Letter Continued...

One question that came up more than a handful of time was "How do we get started?" I have to admit, we hadn't thought about brining applications and newsletters... we might have picked up some new members had we done so. It was a full day and I thank **Frank, John, and Teresa** for giving up their Saturday for such a worthy cause.

Since then, a word keeps popping up in my mind, "mentoring." Sometimes I think when many of us think of "mentoring," we envision introducing a 12-year-old kid to the waterfowling experience... maybe a relative. Some go the extra distance and take inner-city kids or kids whose dads are not present in their lives into the marsh and show them a lasting experience; an experience some will keep for the rest of their lives.

Mentoring applies here to **WWA members**. I like to think that such an introduction will win out over the recreational experience millions of American youth spend their time pursuing these days. You know the type, the one that requires no exertion and whose most frequent injury is carpal tunnel of the thumbs.

But let me take this mentoring thing in a different direction. I think we waterfowlers are sometimes guilty of "taking a pass" on opportunities to mentor young adults, young fathers, young women who are curious about or hope to take up our pastime. Further, I question whether we go out of our way to welcome those experienced hunters who are new to our state.

Those of us who have hunted ducks and geese for decades have our "honey-holes" that we are reluctant to share. We have our old buddies and relatives that we are comfortable with. We don't really care to rock our boat. It's easy to maintain the "same ol', same ol'.

I realize that we may have had experiences where that sweet spot that was passed on in confidence was also unfortunately passed to several others; but I think that's the exception not the rule. Part of mentoring is teaching "waterfowling etiquette."

So here's a question I have to ask myself and pose to you. If I'm 60 or 70 years old, why wouldn't I want to encourage EVERYONE interested in waterfowling to pursue that curiosity. Yes, there is competition for access in our state, but I think the more important matter here is that

future generations come to know and love this waterfowling thing of ours.



WWA Members,

The communication below includes excerpts from e-mails from valued **WWA Director Jim Goldsmith**. Jim works diligently with **Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC) and Hunters Heritage Council (HHC) President Mark Pidgeon** on behalf of **Washington State sportsmen and sportswomen** to preserve our outdoor heritage...including hunting, fishing, trapping etc.

One particular statistic therein should jump off the page at you **WWA members**; can you find it? Also, I encourage you to poke around in various links Jim has supplied. One might find one's self going "Hmmm?"

Note from Jim Goldsmith:

'Regarding the distribution of Discover Pass revenue: I originally obtained the figures from "[Funding Public Recreation With the Discover Pass: Policy and Practicality](#)", a report written in 2013. I brought up those figures multiple times in our meetings; the agency representatives never disputed the figures, and they nodded their heads in agreement several times so it seems the figures are most likely still accurate.

There is also a [survey](#) that all Washington residents involved in outdoor recreation should take to help in this effort: "It is designed by **Washington State University** to help land management agencies, and outdoor recreation groups understand your outdoor recreation wishes, and how to make public recreation lands in Washington State easier for you and future generations to use and enjoy."

I have been representing the hunting community via my position in **WWC** in a series of meetings regarding **Recreational Access Fee Systems in Washington State** (a.k.a. Discover Pass and other recreational land passes).

It would be good to note that 84% of Discover Pass revenue goes to State Parks, 8% to the WDFW, and 8% to the WA Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

The meetings and discussions have been lively and productive. **Mark Pidgeon** is on the [Leadership Team](#), and I am in the [Coordination Workgroup](#). The process to address Recreational Access Fee Systems is complex and involves many outdoor recreation user groups, agencies, and government entities; the [Ruckelshaus Center](#) is facilitating the effort. I encourage you to click on the links provided and familiarize yourselves with the issues and the

project. This affects all of us so please feel free to give your input and ask questions.

The following is an excerpt from the [Ruckelshaus Center Project website](#):

*"To begin addressing these challenges, in 2016, the Washington State Legislature directed the WA State Parks and Recreation Commission, in partnership with the WA Department of Natural Resources and the WA Department of Fish and Wildlife, to work with the Ruckelshaus Center to "coordinate a process to develop options and recommendations to **improve consistency, equity, and simplicity in recreational access fee systems while accounting for the fiscal health and stability of public land management.**" The [legislation](#) also requested exploration of the potential for "federal and state permit fee coordination," including a "single pass to provide access to state and federal lands" and a "comprehensive and consistent approach to recreational fee discounts and exemptions."*

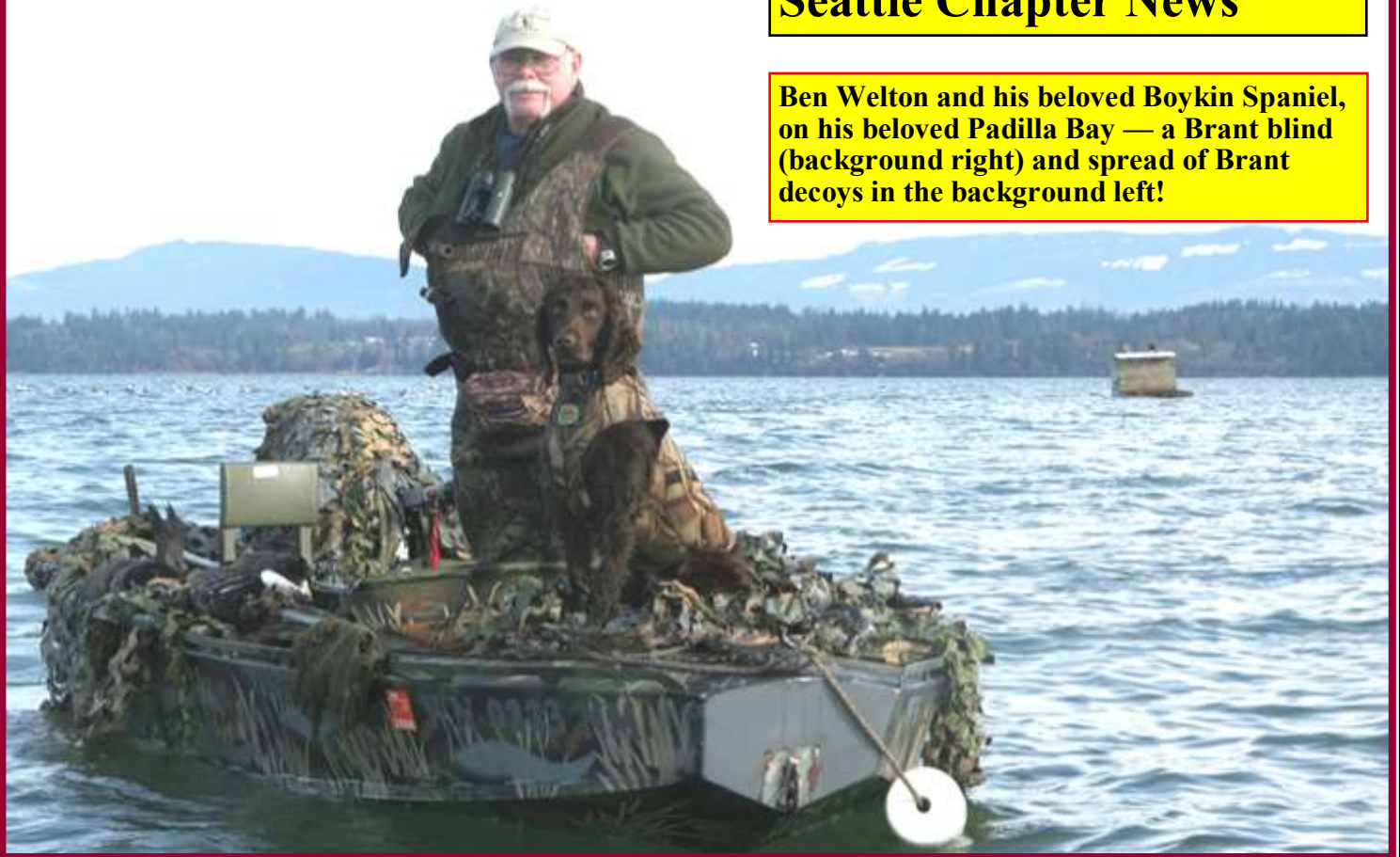

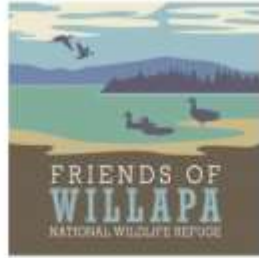
David Hanson and his son, **Ben**, as well as **Paul McGovern**, and his sons, **Dylan** and **Jacob**.

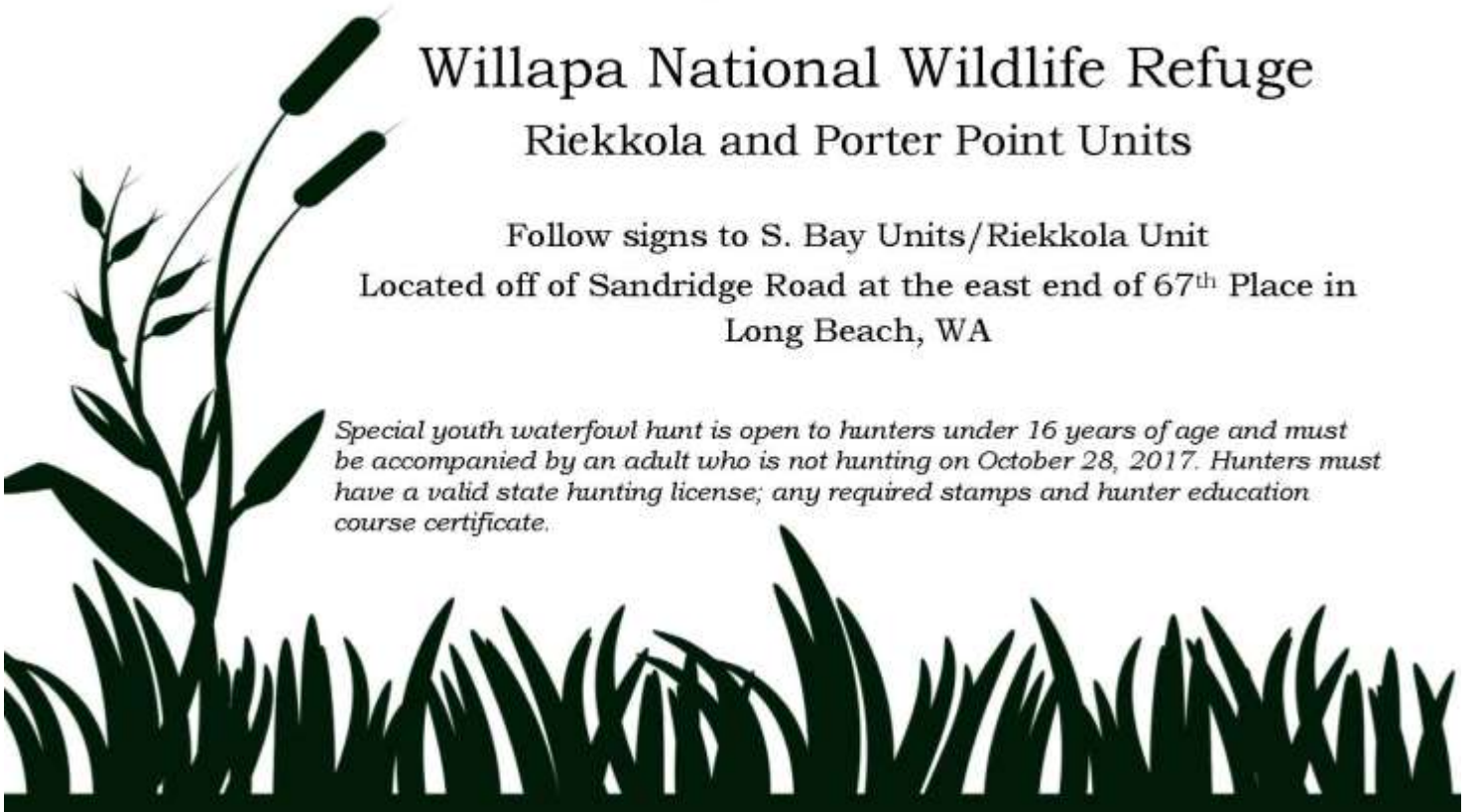

October Chapter Meeting:

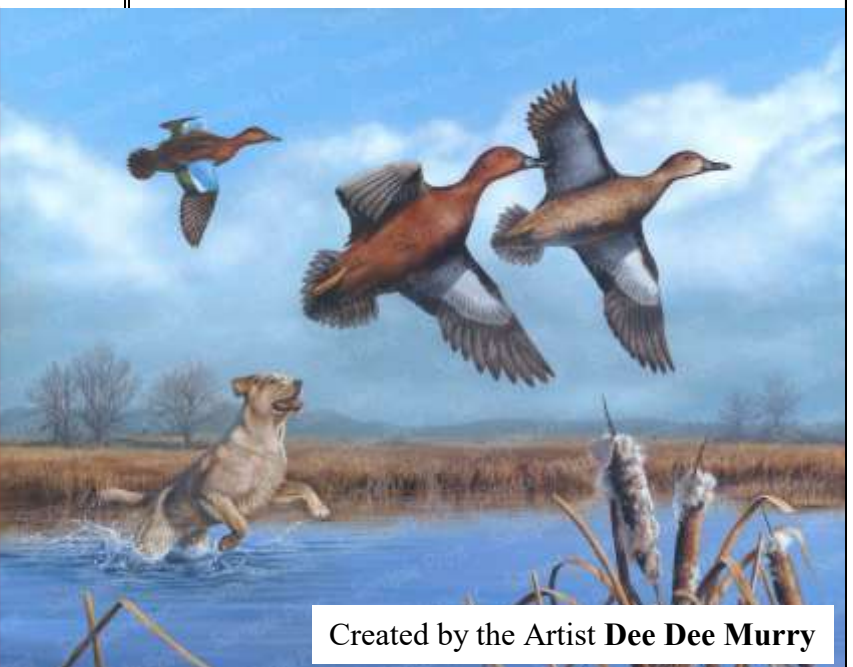

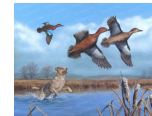

- Working with the Yakama Tribe in banding upland birds and waterfowl, and building duck “blinds” on tribal lands
- Goose and duck nest counts and banding of both with the WDFW and USFWS
- Working with the WDFW on dove counts & planting WDFW food plots in Eastern WA with WWA owned tractor and farming implements
- Sponsoring of the Annual NW Decoy Collector’s Show
- Participating in multiple Sportsman’s shows annually
- Donation of funds and volunteer man hours for Swan Mortality Mitigation Studies
- Donation of funds and man hours to WDFW for goose banding and satellite tracking
- Litter pickup projects at public hunting areas, boat ramps, and along highways; and conducting multiple fund raising banquets annually to pay for all of these “hands on” conservation projects.
